



FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents, Guardians and Students,

On Monday 21st October, as is the custom at our College, we held a special farewell assembly for our Year 12 Class of 2019. The assembly was conducted and organised by our student leaders with the guidance of Leading Teacher, Kim Faulkner and the Student Representative Council. Our Year 12 students were excited, amusing and highly entertaining in their reflections and celebration of their time at the College and the messages and modelling they imparted to their fellow students, were both positive and a true reflection of our College values. YEAR 12 – IMOGEN PRICTOR

Imogen is a confident, considerate, diligent young adult who has worked hard to actively contribute to upholding the school values, and is a positive member of both the school and wider community. They have inspired students from Year 7 to 12 and staff through their leadership of the Queer Straight Alliance Group and has helped to build networks with other LGBTIQ school groups. Together with leaders from Eltham's PRISM group and Viewbank's Stand Out group, they share ideas about how to expand membership, discuss ideas for educating communities about LGBT+ issues and organise joint participation in the annual Midsumma Pride March in 2018. This presence in the wider queer community promotes student agency and provides young queer people with a network that extends beyond their high school.



Imogen was nominated as Montmorency Secondary College's representative for this year's Pauline Toner Award. They are a talented slam poet, competing in the Australian Poetry Slam competition, placing second regionally for a spoken word piece focusing on the strength and determination of youth against injustice worldwide. This was an ode to young people driving change; exposing gun violence, police brutality against people of colour and violence against transgender people. Imogen actively promoted the voices and concerns of marginalised people at the Melbourne Theatre Company's Youth Ambassador program and through mentoring students in the Robertson Youth Orchestra (the youth group of the Heidelberg Symphony Orchestra). Their passion for social justice led to them studying VCE Australian Sign Language as an accelerated subject, which included working with individuals at the Victorian College for the Deaf in the CBD. Imogen has played in the School Production band, performed at many House Offs and assemblies as an active member of the school music program, and even performed at their year 12 graduation ceremony, all the while remaining committed to and excelling at their VCE studies.

She has also been umpiring basketball games for the last year and a half. These are all ages games which are scheduled from 8am to 8pm, 5 to 6 games each Saturday. Mackenzie has grown in confidence and resilience through her experience umpiring games, as not all participants are good sports. She must often remain calm and mature even when adult players or audience members are arguing her calls and displaying neither of these qualities. Mackenzie makes fair calls and demonstrates leadership by running the games she umpires following the rules of good sportsmanship. This allows participants to play basketball in a fun, safe and competitive environment.

Mackenzie is a most remarkable young girl and a most worthy recipient of the Gillespie Upton Rotary Award for Year 9.



YEAR 8 – LIBBY FISHER

Libby arrived at Montmorency Secondary College two years ago with an already impressive list of achievements.

Her passion is the protection of koalas, listed as a vulnerable species. Her passionate advocacy for the protection of this iconic Australian animal fits strongly within the College values of Teamwork, Friendship, Trust, Achievement, Courage and Happiness. However, it is the fourth value that Libby most clearly exemplifies: Achievement.

In Grade Five, Libby began her Koala Crusade with a desire to teach other young people about the difficulties faced by our native wildlife. Her desire to protect the koala led to her being awarded the Pride of Australia Award in 2018 and being profiled on *The 7.30 Report* last July and *Behind the News* last August. Libby's commitment includes a

strong media platform with a dedicated website, blog and Facebook page, devoted to the Koala Crusade.

Libby stands as an outstanding role model within the College where she demonstrates to her peers that one need not be an adult to argue for change in the world.

Of course, Libby's participation in the life of the College is far-reaching, as an active participant in a range of school activities, including charity work, leadership activities and academics. Libby represents an extraordinary example of what one young girl can achieve in a short span of time.

ORIENTATION PROGRAM FOR 2019

On Monday 2nd December students begin the College Orientation Program. For current Year 7-9 students, this program will finish on 13th December 2019. For our senior students (current Year 10-12 students) the Orientation Program will finish on Friday, 6th December 2019.

Students will be allocated into their 2020 classes and during the Orientation period they will be taught 'as much as is possible' by the teachers that they will have the following year. The program is essentially designed to provide students with an insight into all the subjects they will be doing next year. It is an enrichment program that will give students the opportunity to commence the work they will be doing in each subject and provide them with an adjustment period prior to commencing classes in 2020.

It is vital that all students attend all classes during the Orientation period. They will be expected to complete classwork, homework and all assessments which will count towards the students' overall grade in each subject in 2020.

Please note the following important information:

- Students will be required to wear full College uniform during the Orientation Program.
- Students should ensure that they bring writing equipment and a notebook, their Ipad and study planner to all subject classes. Please note that textbooks are not required during the Orientation Program.
- Current Year 8 & 9 students will have a Year Level Activity Day on Monday 16th December 2019 to the Hoyts Cinema in Greensborough.
- Current Year 7 students will have their Year Level Activity Day on Monday 16th December 2019, representing the culmination of a great year's work. Year 7 students will be going to Fun Fields in Whittlesea.
- A large number of students from Years 7 to 12 will be involved within the SRC Leadership Conference which will be held from the 11th-13th December 2019 at Latrobe University.
- During this time the Orientation Program will continue to run for all students not involved in the SRC program and students from years 7 to 9 are required at school. For students not involved within the SRC program the focus will be on being part of a sustainability and environmental challenge through a selection of activity based workshops over the three days of the leadership conference.
- From the 17th December to the 20th December there will be **no regular classes** and students who attend on these days will be assisting staff with alternative tasks.
- Friday, 20th December is the final day of the school year. Students will not be required to attend school; however, staff will be available if parents require them.

Please note that the school buses will cease to be in operation from Monday 16th December, 2019, so alternative arrangements may need to be made.

Students resume school in 2020 as follows:

- Years 7 & 8 on Thursday 30th January, 2020
- Years 9-12 resume on Friday 31st January, 2020

If you have any questions regarding the scheduled program, please contact the College as soon as possible.

We wish everyone a safe holiday period and look forward to seeing our students in the New Year.

SNAKE ALERT

An urgent and important reminder to all students who travel to and from school using the Plenty River path or the sports ovals that they need to be aware tiger snakes are usually active at this time of the year, and that for the last eight years they have been very aggressive during hot weather. Environmental experts predict that snake sightings will become more prevalent this year. I have spoken to a field officer from the City of Banyule, and he said that short bursts of warm weather and sunshine resulted in snakes emerging from the scrub near the river and sunning themselves on paths and concrete surfaces. We have also had some Council warning signs installed near the river paths warning pedestrians to "Beware of Snakes".

In February some nine years ago one of our own students was bitten by a snake while walking near the river path at Simms Road Oval, and he spent a considerable amount of time in hospital. There are now warning signs along the path but all students and pedestrians need to exercise extreme caution when travelling to and from school along the river tracks. It is comforting to know that we have a great network of neighbours and pedestrians who use the river path and if there are any sightings of snakes they let the College know immediately.

How do you describe your creative practice?

A mix between pure unfiltered insanity regulated by an uptight helping of planning. Everything and everyone inspires me, it seems I am always coming across an idea.

How/when/why did you get into this area of work?

Success is when someone goes, 'that's cool'. Or maybe getting work published/finished. I usually celebrate by maybe dancing around or getting something nice, but I don't celebrate for too long. There's still too much to do, and too little time to do it.

What is the best advice you've ever received?

Probably the best advice I ever got is: 'Do everything even if it's risky or you think nobody would like it. There's only so little time to get anything done, why not right now?'

Do you visit your local library? If yes, what do you love about libraries?

Yes yes yes. I love libraries, even though nowadays I usually am at my School's library. I love the fact that everything is at your fingertips, from science fiction, to how rockets are made, and you can read it all. It's also very quiet too, which I enjoy.


Congratulations to all the winners and nominees and a special thanks to all the teachers and students that prepared the night.



Year 12 Change of Preference & Offers

When are offers available?

Offers are emailed to applicants on the day of release 12th December and available in the VTAC account from 2pm the same day. To be considered for offers, you must pay your course application processing fee on time. Find offer dates and payment deadlines on the [Dates and fees page](#).

Current Year 12 students in Victoria are now eligible to receive a course offer in December, following the VCE results and ATAR release. This is in addition to the existing offer rounds in January and February. For more information, download our [fact sheet](#) on December offers for domestic Year 12 students.

How the offer system works

After the course selection authorities have considered your application, they will advise VTAC whether they wish to offer you a place in the course. VTAC advises you, via your VTAC account, of the highest offer on your preference list (if any).

Most course places are allocated in the first January offer round. In subsequent offer rounds, you will be considered for course preferences higher than any offer/s you have received in each round (if any). VTAC will again advise you of the highest offer made (if any).

Note: If you do not pay your course application processing fee by the due date, your application will not be sent to the course selection authorities and you will not be considered for offers.

All offers are provisional

Any offer you receive is subject to you:

meeting eligibility requirements,

having provided full and correct information on your VTAC application, and

attending enrolment at the date and time specified in your offer message.

If you don't meet these requirements, your offer may lapse or be withdrawn.

How many offers?

You can receive a **maximum of one offer per offer round**.

If you do not receive any offers in any of the offer rounds you may be eligible for a supplementary offer if you have given VTAC permission to release your application information to courses with vacancies. See [Change your permission to receive supplementary offers](#).

Changing your preferences

You can change your course preferences between offer rounds as many times as you choose. Before adding a preference, always check the selection criteria to ensure you have met all course requirements. For more information see [Change your course preferences](#).

If you received an offer in one round, and wish to also be considered for courses lower on your preference list in future rounds, you can change your preferences by moving the course that you have been offered below any courses you would still like to be considered for by the relevant change of preference date. Note: Please only move the offered course to below courses you would genuinely consider (not to the lowest preference place).

Supplementary offers

The supplementary offer process allows courses with vacancies to make offers to certain VTAC applicants who have not previously applied for the course.

Supplementary offers commence after *February offer round 1 domestic*.

You may receive supplementary offers if you:

are a domestic applicant (current Year 12 or non-Year 12)

have not received an offer listed on your course preference list, and

have given VTAC permission to release your application to all courses with vacancies.

You give permission to be considered for supplementary offers either at the time of applying, or later in your VTAC user account. Supplementary offers will be processed weekly.

If you receive two or more offers at the same time, you will need to choose which offer to accept – you should not accept more than one offer.

Receiving an offer

When offers are released, you will be notified through your VTAC account.

January offer round 1 offers may also be published by newspapers (in print and/or online) with your permission. You give this permission either at the time of applying, or later in your VTAC user account. If you want to change your permission, see [Permission to publish offers](#).

Check the VTAC website closer to the date to find out if newspapers are publishing offers.

Verbal offers have no status. If you receive a verbal offer you should ask for the name of the person making the offer and contact VTAC immediately.

Accepting an offer

Receiving an offer does not confirm your enrolment in the course. To secure your place, you must follow the enrolment instructions in your offer message. In some cases you may be required to attend enrolment in person on a specific date and time.

If you can't attend enrolment

If you are unable to attend at the specified time, you should ask whether the institution allows an authorised nominee (someone you choose) to enrol on your behalf.

Check the lists of institutions that have provided information about their [enrolment](#) and [deferral](#) policies.

What if I don't receive an offer?

If you don't receive an offer, don't panic.

You may still be eligible for a supplementary offer.

Alternatively, you can check out other courses listed with VTAC and change your preferences as many times as you like, at no additional cost, throughout January and February.

New: December offers for domestic students

- An additional offer round in December provides an opportunity for current VCE and QCE year 12 students to receive an offer within a week of ATAR release
- Preferences can be changed before and after the December round
- Most courses are likely to make some offers in this round
- All courses will still participate in the January round
- Places are reserved in the January round for those applicants without results in time to be considered for this round (IB, states other than Victoria and Queensland)
