Dear Parents, Guardians & Students

Term one of our school year is almost over and apart from three days earlier on we have maintained our face to face teaching model. This has included school camps, outdoor education camps and activities and inter-school sporting competition. Parent information sessions and the student progress report days and evenings have also been held successfully on campus. We certainly hope we can maintain this model in term two and that our students can continue their learning at school and enjoy the full agenda of co-curricular offerings.

Last Friday our Year 7 students undertook two sessions of the 'Elevate Program' which focusses on study skills and time organisation. It was great to see at least 70 parents attend the parent information evening about this event on the Thursday evening.

MOBILE PHONE POLICY

The new mobile phone policy came into effect early in 2020 and required that students who choose to bring mobiles phones to school must have them switched off and securely put away during school hours.

The role of technology

We live in an exciting and technology-rich world and mobile phones are an important modern day communication tool. The school acknowledges that access to a mobile phone by children is important to many of our families in providing a sense of safety for their child while travelling to and from school, and for confirming or changing after school arrangements.

Managing the impact of mobile phones

Mobile phones often create disruptions and distractions in classrooms. Establishing a 'mobile phone free zone' helps teachers to establish and maintain a focused and productive teaching and learning environment.

Research has found that mobile phones can be disruptive in classrooms and open to misuse at school (e.g. accessing inappropriate content, cyberbullying, and unauthorised photography). Additionally, research shows that the unregulated presence of mobile phones in classrooms can undermine students' capacity to think, learn, remember, pay attention and regulate emotion.

At recess and lunchtime our school also values the opportunity for students to communicate with each other face-to-face or be involved in activities rather than being focused on a device, particularly when using the device to engage with social media.

Technology is increasingly impacting the way in which students learn and communicate. Therefore, when a student has been given explicit permission to access and use such devices to enhance learning by the classroom teacher, mobile phones will be permitted for that specific purpose.

For a small number of students with particular health needs, an exception to the policy may be granted. Please contact the school if you would like to discuss this.

We would like to remind all students and members of our school community of our school's expectations regarding the safe and appropriate use of mobile phones at school. The Mobile phone policy can be found on the College website for further information and reference.

Emergency situations

In the event of an emergency or if you need to contact your child, we ask that families contact the staff in the school office who will pass on a message as needed.

Monty hits the Jackpot with the World's Greatest Shave!

This is the 12th year the Interact Club of Montmorency Secondary College has participated in the event to continue raising funds for the Leukaemia Foundation's Blood Cancer research. Club members had been promoting 25 March this year as the day when the traditional shaving, cutting and colouring was to take place at lunch time in the Gym.

The day arrived and we expected a reasonable turn up with 6 students and two staff shaving along with another 6 cutting off

20cms for wigs, and perhaps 100 coming to watch, with maybe 20 colouring. How wrong could we be!

Immediately the lunch bell rang, students started streaming into the gym to pay their gold coin to watch or \$5 to colour. Staff who came to watch and show support were immediately put to work setting up extra chairs on stage as 65 students were lined up by Business Manager Lisa Ball, to have their hair coloured. Quickly rows of chairs were three deep with the front row shaving and cutting and the back two colouring as local hairdresser and parent Colleen was overwhelmed and called for help from her boss Jeanette at Montmorency 'Hair and Body Workshop'. Some permission forms had come in late, swelling numbers of students and next year, children wishing to colour will be asked to complete a form in advance. Interactors were busy shaving and colouring. Some parents and other family members had come watch the fun with an estimated 300 students watching on. At the end of the extended lunch period, the stage was covered in hair with pony-tails bagged up to send to Sustainable Salons for wig making. Our thanks go to all the students and staff who supported this year's event.

The result has been incredible, more than doubling the funds raised on any other year. So far \$9,445 has been donated online with Isabella Cutler raising the most with \$1,807. On the day \$3,645 was collected in cash and banked by our Bursar Lubby. The grand total for 2021 is a whopping \$13,093! Congratulations to Interact Club members staff and students who shaved, and all others involved in supporting this great cause. Far too many people of all ages suffer from blood cancer.

DOES YOUR CHILD NEED TO LEAVE SCHOOL EARLY???

- Students are not permitted to leave the College grounds during the school day without permission.
- It is expected that students will make dental, medical and other appointments, outside school hours wherever possible.
- If a student needs to leave school early for any reason, the following procedure should be followed:
 - 1. The student should have a note from the Parent/Guardian requesting permission for the student to leave school at the specified time.
 - 2. Upon arrival at school, the student is to take the note to their Level Co-ordinator, who will then sign the note and return it to the student.
 - 3. The student then presents the signed note to their class teacher when they need to leave.
 - 4. Once the student leaves class, they will present the note to the General Office staff and sign the Early Leavers record. The office staff will retain the note for attendance recording.
 - 5. If the student needs to return to school later in the day, or following the appointment, they should report to the General Office and sign in.
- It is important that class interruptions are kept to a minimum. Wherever possible, parent/guardians are asked to avoid telephoning the College in order to have students paged or dismissed from class and should follow the above procedure instead.

ARRIVING LATE TO SCHOOL

- Students, who arrive after Home Group, should report to the General Office to sign in and collect a Late Pass.
- A note from a Parent/Guardian, explaining the student's late arrival, should be provided to the General Office, or alternatively, the Parent/Guardian should telephone the General Office, providing a reason for their child's late arrival.
- Students who do not provide an acceptable reason for being late to school may be given detention.

ILLNESS AND FIRST AID

- Students who become ill should advise their classroom teacher that they are feeling unwell and receive permission to report to Sick Bay, located in the General Office.
- Students should not use their mobile phones to contact parents directly during class time.
- Students who report to Sick Bay will be attended to by the College Nurse and, if necessary, parents will be contacted.
- It is important that a current emergency telephone number is listed on each student's school record. Any change to the home address, work address and telephone numbers or emergency contact, should be provided to the General Office immediately.

Throughout the past few weeks, the Year 11 product and design class were tasked with the project of designing, and creating the sets for the 2021 *Matilda* musical. The students were challenged in their creative abilities, guided by Mr Davy, to first consult the client - that being Mr Mill - and as a group, construct concept art and finalise a plan. Once the plan and final drawings were laid out, the class researched and ordered materials and tools, all while going through the correct process of creating a successful product for a buyer which is what the class focusses on throughout the 4 units.





Once the materials arrived the students went through the time consuming and

strenuous process of creating the first set piece, a large frame-like structure, the first of 8 that were to be constructed. However, the class persisted and created the first frame in around a week's time, spending that time reassessing and re-evaluating the plan and changing parts over and over again. Eventually, once the second and third frames were finalised, the class had a proficient method of production, utilising multiple stages of construction with several groups and a few period zeros the class managed to get the production time down to 45 minutes, after finding the most effective use of time and space. By the end of the project, Mr Davy simply had to sit back and watch the students go to work, even when challenged with design changes and decisions the class had learned how to conquer the difficulties. The next stage of production will now be contracting the braces that will hold the frames, and eventually they will be painted to fit in with the musical's

aesthetic. After the experience, the class gained valuable skills on either side of the process, whether that be the design or construction elements of the process, and also enjoyed themselves along the way.

Year 10 Work Experience Program 2021

In 2021, all Year 10 students will complete one week of Work Experience - from Monday 10th May to Friday 14th May, unless there is a change to the COVID19 rules.

The two main purposes of Work Experience are:

- Allow students the opportunity to become temporary members of the workforce and thereby to realise some of the different obligations and circumstances of postschool life.
- Guide students in the choice of permanent careers by enabling them to learn more about the tasks involved and the training required in various occupations.



Some students may complete their work experience week at another time, as placements at some organisations can be difficult to secure. Students first need to fill out the google form (the Work Experience Student Form) and submit this online. All students in Year 10 have been sent this information via a Xuno email at the start of the school year. Once this information has been entered in the database, the official Work Experience Arrangement Form (WEAF) will be generated and distributed to each student. The WEAF must be completed (signed) by all parties: students, employers, parent/guardian, in the areas highlighted on the form. These forms will be issued as arrangements are confirmed, and it is the students' responsibility to ensure that their forms are signed and contain all the necessary and correct information. Please note, the principal is the last person to sign the form and the form needs to be checked by the Careers Coordinator prior to the final principal signature.

The minimum rate of payment is \$5 per day. In the case of educational, charitable, not-for-profit or community welfare organisations, it is likely that students will receive no payment, or asked to agree to donate the wages back to the organisation with the parents' consent. Students receive no payment for work in Commonwealth Government departments and instrumentalities.

It is a general expectation that students find potential work experience employers for themselves, and they are encouraged to have an interview before work experience; but the school will assist in suggesting employers and making contacts where necessary, and in organising all necessary arrangement forms. During the work experience week, all efforts will be made for students to be visited by a teacher and student evaluation forms will be distributed to all work experience employers. It should be remembered that willing employers are not always available, and some students may not secure their first choice. Remember too, that approaching an employer does not guarantee acceptance, and if no response is received within a reasonable time, students should contact the employer again and/or try somewhere else.

It is essential that all placements be arranged by the end of Term One, so that all legal documents can be completed in time. WorkCover and Public Liability Insurance are provided by the Department of Education, and more information is available if requested by employers. If parents have any queries about work experience, or wish to volunteer to have a work experience student in their own workplace, we would be pleased to hear from you.
