A big thank you to Kim Faulkner, Hayley Davies, Karen Giles and Sonia Culcasi and Michelle Clarke as Year Level Leaders for their commitment in ensuring that students were able to have such fun and engaging day.

Our students and staff have been busily preparing for the school production of Matilda. Once again, we are disappointed to have had to postpone our college production of Matilda due to the Covid-19 guidelines and restrictions. We are very keen to lock in alternative dates for the production and we are awaiting DET guidelines before confirming and informing everyone of new scheduled dates. Students involved in the production, together with staff, Jason Mill, Sharon Cooke, Mark Lohrey, Maddie McKinlay and Georgia Robinson have spent many hours during the holidays rehearsing and like all of us, are very hopeful that the COVID-19 restrictions and guidelines are going to enable us to go ahead as planned.

Several of our scheduled school based on-site events this Term have had to be postponed and run in an alternative format due to the existing Covid-19 guidelines and density limits, and we thank our parent/carer and student community for their patience and understanding. We have ensured that The Information Evening that was scheduled for Year 9 to 10 and the Year 10 to 11 Careers Expo on Thursday 22nd July 2021, were run an in an alternative format; the information was pre-recorded and a link was sent out for families to view these presentations. The Bridging/Challenge parent information night scheduled for 3rd August 2021 was postponed to Tuesday 10th August and delivered as a Webex presentation. This is for Year 7 and 8 students who have been invited to undertake Challenge and Bridging English, Mathematics and Science in 2022. We used the WebEx platform for the presentation and had positive feedback from parents saying it was informative and well attended. Thank you to Natalie Henry for coordinating the event and Caitlin Penrose representing the English department, Steve Horn representing the Maths faculty and Sonia Culcasi representing the Science faculty. A special thank you goes out to our students Ryan Lawrence, Oscar Miles, Hannah Mitrevski and Sophia Church who outlined their experiences within the Bridging & Challenge program and who spoke and presented so confidently during the presentation.

The Year 12 GAT that was scheduled to originally occur on 9th June, was postponed to the 29th of July, it was rescheduled to Thursday 12th August and again postponed. We are yet to be informed of the new date.

I would like to draw your attention to some of the wonderful work being done as staff are finding new and innovative ways to run programs. In the absence of being able to run international travel and a student language exchange program; our year 9 & 10 students studying Japanese connected remotely with their fellow students from our sister school in Japan at Takakura High school last week. Students were placed in break out groups enabling them to connect remotely and practice their Japanese/ English skills. It was great to see students engaging with one another, introducing themselves, comparing current Covid situations and sharing the joy of the Olympics. A big thank you to Michelle Bijkersma for organising the event with the help of Mayumi Yokoe, Hamish Yule and Caitlin Hoad.

I would like to finish by saying a very big thank you to whole school community for the outstanding work that is being done in keeping our students engaged and connected to their learning in such difficult circumstances. For our first activity we took some cuttings of a plant and we planted them in a tray. They would go into the Greenhouse to be nurtured. First we made a hole with Hamilton tree planters, then put the plant in, watered it, and hammered in the stakes with protectors around them to keep out the pests. Some students planted up to 7! It was a really fun and enjoyable day for everyone.

We got to see some of the cute farm animals as well like the chickens and the sheep.

I had been part of the language assistant program back in 2017 and had a great time. I wanted to experience that again and was glad to be contacted by Montmorency Secondary College to be part of the team one more time.

The team is great in sharing ideas, new strategies and tools in place. I contributed as well, for example by introducing Blooket in the classroom, targeted activities, etc. I feel like I'm gaining more experience, more knowledge on teaching, more confidence and a more positive personal mindset. Thank you for running the

program again!

"Our language assistant is creative and engaging. Students love her. Teachers love her too. She brings more current language and practices in the classrooms, which young people can relate to. She has been involved in verlan with our senior students, who find this exciting to learn. Our language staff are aware of verlan but are not fluent in it - she is. She has also helped us cement a virtual exchange program with a high school in France and encourages students to communicate often in French, even outside the classroom, as she assists with the running of the French club at lunchtimes too.

Students oracy is improving faster with her assistance, and they are absorbing more current expressions. The main advantage of having a local nativespeaking assistant is that she is able to understand where students are coming from in their thinking and this an invaluable asset when discussing cultural elements, as she is able to draw of parallels, similarities and differences by taping into key cultural assumptions, and misconceptions. This is making a huge difference in a very positive way."

FILM EXCURSION TO ACMI

On Tuesday the 13th of July, our Year 10 French class took a trip to ACMI (Australian Centre for Moving Image) in Federation Square to participate in the workshop "Film it".

To begin with, our class was introduced to the concepts of genre, different film tropes, the stages of a narrative and to the different phases of film production, including pre-production, production and post-production as well as how to shoot a film using interesting camera angles and techniques. In small groups, we began to break down scripts given to us, by annotating and using storyboards to plan out the production of our film.

We were taught how to operate film equipment, including a camera, tripod and microphone before heading out into Federation Square to begin production on our films. We were given a short amount of time to create our films, shooting in various locations around Fed Square and along the Yarra River.

In what felt like no time, we were back inside beginning the post-production process. During this time, we learnt how to edit our films using the program FinalCutPro, inserting sound effects, transitions, music and cutting out our bloopers.

The staff at ACMI then taught us how to export our footage and we watched each groups' final film as a class.

Overall, this day was really enjoyable and beneficial for us, as we are now going to be using our new skills to create our own films throughout this semester. Huge thanks to the staff at ACMI for this experience and to Madame Luberto and Megan for accompanying us :)

What is the Early Entry Program?

Because we don't think a singular score or the state of the world should derail your life plans, we announced the first ever Swinburne Early Entry Program last year – an initiative that saw hundreds of Class of 2020 Year 12 students admitted into the course of their choice, no ATAR required.

Once again, we're making conditional offers into select courses based on an application and a recommendation from your school. If you're currently studying Year 12 and would like to be assessed on criteria outside of your ATAR, tell us how you think a Swinburne course could help you to make your mark on the world.

To be eligible and receive a full offer, you'll still need to complete Year 12 and meet the course prerequisites. But you won't have to sweat the ATAR you end up with.



Aspire – Early Admissions Program to La Trobe Open 19th April – 17th September

At La Trobe, we believe there is more to being a good student than marks alone. The Aspire program rewards the skills and knowledge students gain from the positive impact they have made on their school or community through community service or volunteerism. Designed to give Year 12's the tools they

need to succeed at La Trobe and beyond, students accepted into the Aspire program will get:

- A taste of university life at La Trobe with special on-campus events before the year commences
- The chance to meet and connect with like-minded students
- Leadership opportunities, career development, networking, and industry mentoring
- VCE revision lectures for Year 12's in the September school holidays
- Access to La Trobe's extensive library and campus resources
- Induction into La Trobe's Enrichment Program to prepare for what is to come

Successful applicants also receive their **early conditional offer** in September for their chosen course along with minimum ATAR requirements. Many courses have a minimum ATAR of 55.00, but some professional degree programs have higher requirements. Up to 40 Aspire scholarships, worth \$5,000 per year for up to four years, will be awarded to leading eligible Aspire students.

The Minimum ATAR Table shows the minimum ATAR for some professional degree courses for entry through Aspire in 2022. Should an applicant's preferred course not be listed on this table, then the minimum ATAR is 50.00.

ACU Guarantee

Due to the overwhelming number of applications we received last year through ACU Guarantee, we are very excited to continue this early offer program in 2021.

Applications are now open_

How it works

ACU Guarantee completely removes the ATAR requirement for a student's desired course and makes an early conditional offer to successful applicants prior to sitting final exams. This alleviates common stresses and anxiety many students have about achieving their perfect score.

Instead, this program will consider a student's Year 11 results and a predicted selection rank will be generated by our admissions team when assessing applications. The offer is conditional on completing VCE exams and meeting the subject prerequisites for their preferred course.

Students may be concerned that their Year 11 results aren't the best due to COVID-19 impacts, however rest assured that all Year 12 students are in the same boat and this will be taken into account. Applications for this program are free of charge and available through the <u>ACU Guarantee portal</u>, so we encourage all students to apply – they never know what offer could await them.

Once students begin an application, they can select two course preferences* and will be prompted to upload Year 11 results/reports (or the ACU Guarantee Supplementary Assessment form) as evidence of their achievements last year. They will also have the opportunity to provide up to three personal statements addressing different categories (maximum 200 words each) outlining personal circumstances and motivation for university study.

In addition to applying through the ACU Guarantee portal, students will also need to apply through VTAC. In Victoria, ACU can only finalise offers if students list the course as their highest eligible preference in their VTAC application. The good news is we will already have assessed their application so there is no waiting or worrying about whether they will get in. Students will be notified of their application outcome via email and offers will be made fortnightly.

Applications close midnight Friday 24 September.



Open Day 2021

Have your Year 12 students join us at our beautiful Parkville and Southbank campuses and experience Open Day on 15 August.

This year, Open Day will run a little differently due to COVIDSafe capacity restrictions. However, they can still expect to explore our spaces and enjoy a tailored event designed for students uncover their ideal course and major.

Registration for every attendee is mandatory and we recommend only bringing along one family member (and they'll need to register separately).
