# **GAT: Wednesday 7<sup>th</sup> September**

The General Achievement Test will run for all Year 12 students on Wednesday 7<sup>th</sup> September, and will be the first time that the whole Year 12 cohort will undertake this assessment – including VCAL. This year, the GAT is run in 2 sections, a Literacy and Numeracy assessment for all students; and the second section includes the general assessment areas that scored VCE students.


# **MATHS NEWS**

# **DEVELOPING STRONG MATHEMATICAL MINDSETS**

Many of us have experienced moments in a mathematics class where we simply struggled to get the 'right' answers and if we didn't, we felt we simply weren't smart enough or were just not good at maths. In many ways maths felt like a performance-based subject, one in which we felt pressured to succeed.

Shifting mathematical mindsets results in improved performance. Based on growth mindset research by Dr Carol Dweck, Jo Boaler from Standford University investigated the links between mathematical mindsets and maths achievement. Jo found that students with growth mindsets towards mathematics 'outrank the other students by the equivalent of more than one year of mathematics'. This important finding led her and the team at Standford University to develop a list of norms to practice with students that help develop strong mathematical mindsets:

- Everyone can learn maths to the highest levels
- Mistakes are valuable
- Questions are really important
- Maths is about creativity and making sense
- Maths is about connections and communicating
- Depth is much more important than speed
- Maths class is about learning not performing



This year the Maths Faculty at Montmorency Secondary College will start to unpack these norms and explore ways we can foster this development in our students. Parents can also support the development of growth mindsets in students at home by reinforcing these norms, particularly that everyone can learn maths to the highest levels and that mistakes are valuable and where the learning really starts to happen.

# **CROSS COUNTRY 2022**

Our team of Cross Country runners began their odyssey on a cold and wet day at Eltham Lower Park where, with athletes of the local District schools, they completed a challenging 3km course that included a picturesque bike path along the Yarra as well as muddy and water-logged grassy surfaces. Nine members of our small but determined team progressed to the Northern Metropolitan Region competition at Bundoora Park where, on a wintery day, they encountered a very good standard of running with the best athletes of the region. In the NMR competition, Matilda L'Estrange achieved first place in the Girls 16 year race and Hannah Scott achieved second in the Girls 17-20 year race. Also finishing in the top 12 of their respective NMR races, and therefore progressing to compete at the SSV State Championships, were Charlotte Mawhinney (7<sup>th</sup>, G17-20y), Thomas Short (5<sup>th</sup>, B14), Georgia L'Estrange (5<sup>th</sup>, G14y) and Kai Bunyard (8<sup>th</sup>, B12-13y). Rounding out the team effort were Matthew Layton, just outside the cut for progression (14th, B12-13y), as well as Lachlan Anderson (78th, B12-13y) and Ellen Geraghty (66<sup>th</sup>, G12-13y). A great effort by all of our young athletes to complete a seriously tough course, and what a fabulous result to have six Monty students qualified to run at State Champs – nearly half of the original team!

This year, the School Sport Victoria State Cross Country Championships were held at the beautiful Yarra Valley Racing Club in Yarra Glen. This was another challenging course involving a muddy and slippery start over hill and dale followed by a long, tough run home on the grassy racetrack in heavy conditions to reach the finish post in front of the grandstand. All six of our athletes completed the course with Tilly L'Estrange 5<sup>th</sup> and Hannah Scott 7<sup>th</sup> – a fabulous result for each of these girls, both top ten in the State! Congratulations also to Kai (54<sup>th</sup>), Georgia (40<sup>th</sup>), Thomas (30<sup>th</sup>) and Charlotte (70<sup>th</sup>) for solid efforts in each of their respective races.

Tilly and Georgia had so much fun that they went on to compete at the Victorian All Schools Cross Country Championships at Bundoora Park on 23<sup>rd</sup> July – Tilly achieved 9<sup>th</sup> place and Georgia 37<sup>th</sup> place – another fabulous achievement for both girls. The All Schools competition, organised by Athletics Australia and School Sport Australia, is the selection trial to represent Victoria at the Australian Cross Country Championship. Tilly's 9<sup>th</sup> place qualifies her to run in the Victorian State team at the Nationals next month in Adelaide. Best wishes to Tilly and congratulations to each of our athletes for their high achievements in Cross Country running this year.

# DOES YOUR CHILD NEED TO LEAVE SCHOOL EARLY???

- Students are not permitted to leave the College grounds during the school day without permission.
- It is expected that students will make dental, medical and other appointments, outside school hours wherever possible.
- If a student needs to leave school early for any reason, the following procedure should be followed:
  - 1. The student should have a note from the Parent/Guardian requesting permission for the student to leave school at the specified time.
  - 2. Upon arrival at school, the student is to take the note to their Level Co-ordinator, who will then sign the note and return it to the student.
  - 3. The student then presents the signed note to their class teacher when they need to leave.
  - 4. Once the student leaves class, they will present the note to the General Office staff and sign the Early Leavers record.

    The office staff will retain the note for attendance recording.
  - 5. If the student needs to return to school later in the day, or following the appointment, they should report to the General Office and sign in.
- It is important that class interruptions are kept to a minimum. Wherever possible, parent/guardians are asked to avoid telephoning the College in order to have students paged or dismissed from class and should follow the above procedure instead.

# ARRIVING LATE TO SCHOOL

- Students, who arrive after Home Group, should report to the General Office to sign in and collect a Late Pass.
- A note from a Parent/Guardian, explaining the student's late arrival, should be provided to the General Office, or alternatively, the Parent/Guardian should telephone the General Office, providing a reason for their child's late arrival.
- Students who do not provide an acceptable reason for being late to school may be given detention.

# **ILLNESS AND FIRST AID**

- Students who become ill should advise their classroom teacher that they are feeling unwell and receive permission to report to Sick Bay, located in the General Office.
- Students should not use their mobile phones to contact parents directly during class time.
- Students who report to Sick Bay will be attended to by the College Nurse and, if necessary, parents will be contacted.
- It is important that a current emergency telephone number is listed on each student's school record. Any change to the home address, work address and telephone numbers or emergency contact, should be provided to the General Office immediately.

## **YEAR 10 SURVEY**

Our Year 10 students have been invited to participate in the first year of a new longitudinal study of young people in Australia. In 2022, the GENERATION study will focus on the activities and aspirations of Year 10 students – what they are doing now and what they think they would like to do in the future with study, training and employment.

Each student who completes the survey will receive an individual summary of their careers interests, while the school will receive a summary report of the plans of Year 10 students as a group. No individual student will be identified in the school report.

There are plans for another 10 years of surveys in this longitudinal study. Students will be asked if they are interested in participating in later years of the study. If students agree to participate in later years, they will be asked to provide their contact details. Please note that it is not a requirement for students to participate in later years, and all questions in the survey are voluntary.

Further information about the study will provided to all Year 10 families along with a consent form. All data will be kept strictly confidential and no individual student or school will be identified in published data or reports.

The survey will be undertaken in Industry & Enterprise starting from the 10<sup>th</sup> October 2022.

From July 6-8 this year, I participated in a new opportunity with Melbourne University called SheCommerce. SheCommerce is a new program designed to immerse female students from years 9-12 in commerce education and experiences.

I attended daily lectures, tutorials, workshops and team building events as well as touring the University's Melbourne campus. The topics included economics, foreign trade and stocks, problem solving, climate, art, technology and alumni talks. There will be further events for my cohort over the next 3 years.

The experience was fun, expansive and highlighted some great opportunities. I feel really fortunate to be included in this year's intake of only 40 girls from across Victoria. All I had to do to apply for this fully funded position, was submit a detailed application to the University of Melbourne SheCommerce program representative. #### The Monash Guarantee

Every Monash course has a Monash Guarantee ATAR, which is lower than the expected selection rank for that course.
