We have also reset behavioural expectations through our Behaviour Framework, where the Behaviour Matrix is visible in every classroom and outlines expectations required in each of the learning spaces; alongside the Golden Expectations/Standards for behaviour that promotes a quality learning environment.

International Women's Day: Pauline Toner Prize

On Tuesday 11th March, the College had the exciting opportunity to present one of our student candidates to be awarded with the Pauline Toner Prize. We have sought out some of our most fabulous students, and presented Izzy Greenhalgh for this prestigious award, and she won!

Now in its eighth year, the annual prize not only recognises the achievements of local young women active in the areas of social justice, the environment and/or gender equality, but also remembers the achievements of the Hon. Pauline Toner, the first female Victorian State Government Minister, the first female state member for Greensborough and the first female Mayor and Councillor for Diamond Valley.

The Pauline Toner Prize is available to young women in Years 9 and above who live and/or study in the Eltham Electorate. Nominations must show how the nominee has shown leadership in promoting social justice, gender equality and/or preserving our environment, including action on climate change, and must indicate the unique, stand out qualities of the nominee.

MATHS NEWS

In 2023 the VCAA released new study designs for VCE Mathematics including Foundation, General, Methods, Specialist, Vocational Major Numeracy, as well as for the junior V2.0 Mathematics curriculum (that was released in 2024 and is to be fully implemented this year). A key change in these curriculums is the requirement for students to draw on their mathematical reasoning skills to solve real-world problems.

Historically students may have been able to rely on their familiarity with applying mathematical formulae and procedures within a given context to solve problems. However, they now need to draw upon, not only their understanding and fluency in applying mathematical processes, but increasingly their reasoning skills: their ability to select and apply appropriate mathematical techniques to solve open-ended real-world problems. This better prepares our students for success in the 21st Century workplace.

At Montmorency Secondary College we support the approach of the junior V2.0 curriculum which better prepares our students for VCE and their broader careers. V2.0 has an increased focus on investigations and modelling tasks that develop these reasoning skills in our students. However, we equally recognise that this requires a transition process for our learners and we need to support them in making these adjustments. To this end, we are implementing the following approaches:

- More investigations and modelling tasks from Years 7-10 where students have the opportunity to apply their mathematical knowledge and skills to solve problems;
- Broader assessment tasks (that are not limited to a specific topic or Area of Study) where students are required to select from several strands of mathematics to solve particular problems;
- Teaching and learning opportunities that promote development of reasoning skills, such as problem-solving lessons and open-ended tasks;
- Encouraging positive dispositions towards mathematics maths anxiety is a reality for many students, particularly
 during the transition from primary to secondary school. Together teachers and parents can support our learners in
 their development of growth mindsets, acknowledging that it is okay to struggle and that problem solving is difficult.
 Yet in this struggle is where the real learning lies. We learn and grow by taking our time and learning from our
 mistakes. Without struggle and mistakes, our growth can be limited.
- Supporting students to use their maths classes to strengthen their mathematical 'muscles'. Some components of this include:
 - * Our instructional model where maths classes include a period of explicit teaching of key concepts and skills; with a significant component of independent student work time. A useful analogy here is the physical gym: if we want our bodies to grow stronger, we go to the gym to work out. The same applies to mathematics: we need to exercise our maths skills in class, where our teachers/trainers are available as support.
 - * Summarising key concepts and skills learnt in class is best done outside of class, after the workout. Taking notes outside of class time has many benefits: students experience multiple exposures of content and revisit and summarise their learning in their own words; they select the worked examples to document that match their individual needs. Students are able to use these notes as references for all their assessments for Foundation and General Mathematics, and for some of their assessments for Methods and Specialist. Teachers of course provide summary sheets and board notes, which students are able to draw on in developing their individualised theory summaries.

- Homework Club Years 7-12 Mondays and Wednesdays after school in the Resource Centre. Maths staff attend to support students in their maths work;
- Recreational Maths for Years 7-12 Mondays and Thursdays in C-block (keep an eye out on Compass for our weekly Maths Riddles!); and
- Senior Maths Support for Years 10-12 to support senior students succeed in their learning.

It was hard to balance across the stool in a position that would allow the dress to flow in a way that would lend itself to the 'levitation' that would occur with

the power of Photoshop, after processing. We only had a few minutes to photograph the students before lunchtime ended and we had to get to Period 5, so considering the short amount of time we had, the success rate of the photography was well worth the effort.

All three students will receive their own printable copies of the final, edited artworks as thanks for their participation.

Plans for the next few weeks include doing some portraiture work (volunteers needed!) as well as a chance to use the compact cameras to take some special effects photos. We are looking for more members, so we can share the experiences on a regular basis. There's no actual work involved for the students, just a whole lot of fun experiences, so if your child needs a break from their day, they are most welcome to come and see what we are all about. 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FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors. Excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works while sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are a part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$154 for primary school students
- \$256 for secondary school students

HOW TO APPLY

New applicants should contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from the website below.

If you applied for CSEF at your child's school last year, you do not need to complete an application form this year unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.

You only need to complete an application form if any of the following changes have occurred:

- new student enrolments: your child has started or changed schools this year.
- changed family circumstances: such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing this year.

PROCEDURES FOR STUDENTS ARRIVING LATE/LEAVING EARLY

Arriving Late to School

- Students who arrive late to school, or after the class roll has been taken in Home group, should report to the General Office to sign in at the Compass kiosk, using their Student ID card.
- An Attendance Note should be placed on Compass by the student's Parent/Carer, explaining the student's late arrival.
- Students who do not provide an acceptable reason for being late to school may be given detention.

Arriving Late to Class

• A student who arrives late to any class disrupts the work of the class. The College requires all students to be on time. Persistent lateness will be dealt with by the class teacher and the problem referred to the Level Co-Ordinator if punctuality does not improve.

Leaving School Early

- Students are not permitted to leave the College grounds during the school day without permission.
- It is expected that students will make dental, medical and other appointments outside school hours wherever possible.
- If a students needs to leave school early for any reason, the following procedure should be followed:
 - 1. The Parent/Carer should add an Attendance Note on Compass to confirm that the student will be required to leave school at a particular time.
 - 2. When the student needs to leave for their appointment, they are to advise their class teacher, who will then check Compass for the Parent/Carer's Attendance Note.
 - 3. Once the class teacher confirms that the student can leave, the student is to make their way to the General Office and, using their Student ID card, sign out at the Compass kiosk.
 - 4. If the student needs to return to school later in the day, or following the appointment, they should report to the General Office and sign in at the Compass kiosk using their Student ID card.
- It is important that class interruptions are kept to a minimum. Wherever possible, parent/guardians are asked to avoid telephoning the College in order to have students paged or dismissed from class and should follow the above procedure instead.

Year 10 Work Experience Program 2025

In 2025, all Year 10 students will complete one week of Work Experience - from Monday 12th May to Friday 16th May.

The two main purposes of Work Experience are:

- Allow students the opportunity to become temporary members of the workforce and thereby to realise some of the different obligations and circumstances of post-school life.
- Guide students in the choice of permanent careers by enabling them to learn more about the tasks involved and the training required in various occupations.

It is a general expectation that students find potential work experience employers for themselves and are encouraged to have an interview before commencing. The school may assist in suggesting employers and making contacts where necessary. Students should then complete the Work Experience Preparation form and return to the College where this information will be entered into the database and the official Work Experience Arrangement Form (WEAF) will be generated and distributed to each student. The WEAF must be completed (signed) by all parties: students, employers, parent/guardian, in the highlighted areas on the form. This form will be issued as arrangements are confirmed, and it is the students' responsibility to ensure that their form is signed and contains all the necessary and correct information. Please note, the form should be returned to the Careers Co-Ordinator for checking and will then be forwarded to the Principal for final signature.

The minimum rate of payment is \$5 per day. In the case of educational, charitable, not-for-profit or community welfare organisations, it is likely that students will receive no payment, or asked to agree to donate the wages back to the organisation with the parents' consent. Students receive no payment for work in Commonwealth Government departments or agencies. During the work experience week, all efforts will be made for students to be visited by a teacher from the College and student evaluation forms will be distributed to all work experience employers.

It should be remembered that willing employers are not always available, and some students may not secure their first choice. Remember too, that approaching an employer does not guarantee acceptance, and if no response is received within a reasonable time, students should contact the employer again and/or try somewhere else. Some students may complete their work experience week at another time, as placements at some organisations can be difficult to secure.

It is essential that all placements be arranged by the end of Term One so that all legal documents can be completed in time. Work Cover and Public Liability Insurance are provided by the Department of Education and more information is available if requested by employers.

If parents have any queries about work experience, or wish to volunteer to have a work experience student in their own workplace, we would be pleased to hear from you.
